# GEOGRAPHY 485 Senior Project

### **Catalog Description:**

GEOG 485. Senior Project. 1 cr.

Capstone project in Urban and Regional Planning. Completion of independent planning project with public presentation of findings. Graded P/F. Every semester. Prerequisite: Co-registration in GEOG 421 or GEOG 450.

### Institutional Learning Goals in this Course:

- 1. Liberal Knowledge and Skills of Inquiry, Critical Thinking, and Synthesis: In this course, students will utilize empirical data, develop a problem solution, and prepare a persuasive written proposal for action as appropriate.
- 2. Core Skills: While mastering the content oriented objectives below, students will also find improvement in their written, oral, and cartographic communication skills. Students will also examine statistical tables and be asked to draw conclusions from them. Problem solving skills will be addressed in role playing situations, through evaluation of government policies, and in examining theoretical work of selected planners. Students will make a formal oral presentation of their work.
- 3. Acquisition and Application of Specialized Knowledge: Students will integrate key concepts and foundation knowledge needed in contemporary planning practice.
- Values and Social Responsibility: Students will be frequently confronted with the alternative value systems. Implications for decision making within culturally diverse regions will be developed.
- 5. Appreciation of Cultural Identities: This course serves to assist students in dealing with local cultural diversity through the approach of contemporary planning and community development.

**Objectives:** This course provides an opportunity to complete a major planning project from identification of the problem to presentation of recommendations for action in a professional format.

The scoring rubric is attached. Three elements are described as fundamental, and must be completed to pass: Original research, Legal and ethical review, and presentation deadlines. An additional ten Advanced Elements are used to comprehensively evaluate the project and its presentation. To pass the course, at least nine of the Advanced Elements must be rated as satisfactory or excellent, with at least 3 of the elements rated as excellent. In the planning profession, most real world projects have some weakness, so some balancing is expected in the Advanced Elements.
